We are so blessed to have new life and energy about our church, and grateful for all that these new people are already bringing.

As we gain people we also lose, and we're sorry that Andrew and Bonnie Kennedy are moving on from APC on 21<sup>st</sup> May. Andrew became our youth worker 2 years ago and he and Bonnie have become part of our fellowship. Andrew has established a Sunday evening youth group and a successful Friday night youth club, both bringing unchurched young people into our church. He has also made himself useful in many other ways, especially on the sound desk! He and Bonnie have both been involved in the LOGOS youth project and have consolidated our links with them. We wish Andrew and Bonnie God's blessing as they move back to Edinburgh and other work opportunities. #### **Pastoral Care Team**

As the warmer days approach and the lambs appear in the fields around us, my thoughts turn to one of the most well known and loved of the Psalms, 23. "The Lord is my Shepherd". Often known as the pastoral psalm, it sums up all that we mean by pastoral care which is a vital part of our church's ministry. This largely goes unnoticed, but is quietly and lovingly carried out by members of the Pastoral Care Group, who regularly visit lonely, elderly, sick, bereaved, mentally or physically disabled people, either in their own homes or the local Care Homes, and also deliver newsletters, and church flowers each week, and various other caring tasks.

The aims of the Pastoral Care Group are therefore to assist the Ministers by supporting members of the congregation who require regular visitation to provide empathy, compassion, a listening ear, and prayer, while always exercising strict confidentiality.

The Church of Scotland Safeguarding Policy says, "The love of Christ compels us to care and protect those who are vulnerable in the Church and society".



As Convener of the Pastoral Care Group in our church, my role is to coordinate our team of visitors, ensure all members have the necessary training and support, and report any urgent or specialised pastoral issues to the Minister or district Elder.

At present there are 14 members in the Group, but we could always use more. If you feel called to help with this work, you will be made very welcome.

#### **Prayer Shawl Ministry**

The picture shows new prayer shawls being dedicated in Our Lady of Perpetual Succour Church.

Looking back over the past few months, the group have fulfilled a need in the community of Auchterarder and wider. It started last October when The Guild had a talk about Prayer Shawls from Linda Young who founded the Buckhaven and Wemyss Prayer Shawl Group. Linda left the ladies of the Guild about 50 prayer shawls which, by the end of the evening had all been taken.

In January about 30 prayer shawls, from our own group, were dedicated in church with an invitation to those who wished one to take one. Most of them went. Since then about 10 more have been given away – A grand total of 90



prayer shawls, including those donated to the Guild, since October bringing comfort to those who received them. The group have also given 8 beautifully knitted blankets to the Inner Wheel to be sent to Ukraine. We would welcome more donations of wool and also more knitters.

We meet on Tues 2<sup>nd</sup> May at 10.30 in the Garden Room. Thereafter we will have a break until Tues 5<sup>th</sup> Sept.

On Tues 20<sup>th</sup> June one of our members has invited us to her garden for afternoon tea. Further details of this will be given on Tues 2<sup>nd</sup> May.



#### My trip to the Holy Land with APC by Sandra Miller

So, two-and-a-bit years later than planned, our Israel trip eventually – and I mean EVENTUALLY! – left Edinburgh for Tel Aviv! There were 33 of us from around Scotland – with 11 members from APC included. Sadly Iain Paton, our Assistant Minister, was unable to lead along with Marjorie, his wife, so Stephen Miller stepped up to the mark as much as he could – but thanks must go to Marjorie, who did a brilliant job though all the ups and downs of travel delays and cancellations, lost luggage issues and even a broken wrist – not hers, I hasten to add, but another member of our party! Unfortunately,

we lost a day of the trip due to a flight cancellation from Edinburgh to Heathrow; however, with the help of both Marjorie and our guide, Isam, we managed to fit in as much as we could – and boy, did we fit in a lot! So, in this one article you will see a few of my personal highlights, otherwise it would be a book! You'll have to ask others for theirs!







We began in Tiberias on the shores of Lake Galilee and, for me, it was the best bit of the trip – so peaceful and picturesque and, on this occasion, we certainly knew without a shadow of a doubt it was





EXACTLY where Jesus and his disciples had lived, travelled and ministered. Many of the other sites of course are open to speculation as to their absolute authenticity, although that does not lessen the impact of being close to the places and areas where the main events around Jesus' life took place right on the shore with the Rev Muriel, Pearson, the Assistant Minister from St Andrews Church of Scotland, Jerusalem. We then went for a sail on the lake itself and as you can see, the captain raised a Scottish flag for us whilst playing 'Scotland the Brave', which he seemed to think was our national anthem – we could do worse!

Surviving a journey up the road to Mt Tabor with about a million hairpin bends (!) we then visited Nazareth and had an excellent visit to a 'village' similar to how one might look in Jesus' time — not with the apartment blocks behind, of course! And you'll see, Rosemary even had a go on a wine press! There was also an example of a rock tomb.











When we stopped at many of the sites, we either sang an appropriate hymn and/or had an appropriate Bible passage read by someone in the group, ably accompanied by Sheila Ferguson-Smith and Stephen on their recorders!! It felt a bit odd at first, but we all got used to it; the inhabitants see pilgrims doing the same all the time and seem just to take it in their stride!

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
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We left Tiberias after 3 days and headed down the Jordan Valley after visiting the Mount of the Beatitudes, going to see the Jordan baptismal site, through Jericho, the Mount of Temptation and on to Jerusalem, where we had our first sight of this melting-pot of a city.



Our hotel was right beside the Old City Wall and a short walk from the Damascus Gate, which took us straight into the Old Town. We were within walking distance of


many if the major sites: in fact our own hotel overlooked one if the possible sites of Golgotha – that is now a bus park!



Town, including walking the Via Dolorosa, which was SO BUSY with shoppers, sightseers and pilgrims you almost could imagine that it may have been exactly like that as Jesus walked there on his last journey.



One of the most difficult places for me was our visit to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre – again a possible site of Jesus' crucifixion and the tomb. It is in the Christian Quarter and under the jurisdiction of 6 denominations: Catholic Armenians; Orthodox Greeks; Orthodox



frantic and although we were able to see more, there were 3 or 4 different services taking place all at the same time!

In total contrast was the visit that same afternoon to the Garden Tomb. The garden itself was beautifully tended and so peaceful in contrast to so many other sites – whether authentic or not. Again, just being in the places where Jesus and his followers had been was enough.



There are so many other places we visited: Grotto of the Nativity, Emmaus, the Israel model of Jerusalem and, of course, the photos are not welcome!

What a different experience when we went to morning worship at St. Andrews' Church - no idols, peace and

quiet and all one faith! Afterwards, and in the rain!, we visited the Mount of Olives and the beautiful Garden of Gethsemane.



Bethlehem and the Basilica and Museum with an amazing famous Western Wall, where

Other favourite visits were The Al Shurooq School for the Blind – an amazing school providing full care and education for Palestinian blind children ages 3 through 12 years old, and then supporting them through secondary and higher education by providing staff training and resources. We happened to visit on Mothers' Day and were all given a flower by the children, as well as an amazing welcome speech in perfect English by a little boy!

And the last day when we visited Qumran (the site of the Dead Sea Scrolls) and Masada was amazing – and, of course, we had a float in the Dead Sea itself – a sight you wouldn't want to see! So, an amazing trip full of contrasts: different faiths, peoples, attitudes, dress, food and in company with a great group. Shalom!
